Coming to Jesus' Table

his fall, we've launched a series called *A Meal With Jesus*. We've been savoring the meals Jesus shares throughout the Gospel of Luke, and tasting what it means to share His company, participate in His community, and enter into His mission.

As we've done so, we've made a change in our worship I wanted to have a conversation with you about: we've been celebrating Holy Communion weekly at all 3 of our Sunday services. This change isn't wholly new: if you have been attending our 11AM service, or have attended The Way service in our pre-COVID past, you know that we had already been celebrating the Lord's Supper every week there. But, as we've started our fall series and have been sitting at Jesus' tables in Luke, we thought it was fitting to have our entire community begin coming to Jesus' Table in worship each week.

Why?

First, there's a *spiritual reason*. One liturgy for Communion calls the Lord's Supper "a feast of remembrance, communion, and hope." In other words, when we come to the Table, there's past, present, and future-tense things happening: we remember what Jesus did for us in the past, we commune with the risen Lord in the present, and we taste a bit of our future hope. While we don't believe that the physical elements of bread and wine/juice somehow transform into human flesh and blood, we do believe that when we come to the Table in faith, there's a spiritual alchemy that transpires in which we really do experience the Gospel. As one of our faith statements, the *Westminster Confession of Faith*, puts it, when we commune together, we "really and indeed" feed "upon Christ crucified and all the benefits of His death."

Second, there's a *historic reason*. Simply put, the Eucharist is the Christian family meal, and through most of our history, it's been the Church's practice to celebrate our family meal Sunday by Sunday when we gather together. Although no one can compile video footage of what life looked like in the earliest days of the church, the glimpses we have from the New Testament suggest that the Church, from its earliest days, celebrated a eucharistic meal each Sunday when they gathered to worship (i.e. Acts 2:42; 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:17-22). Several writings from church leaders in Christianity's early centuries bear witness that this was the Church's common practice.

In our own particular tradition, the Reformer John Calvin, as he was organizing the church's worship and service in the Swiss city of Geneva, advocated for celebrating the Lord's Supper every week. He insisted that Jesus gave His Church the sacrament of Holy Communion "for a frequent exercise of our faith and charity, of which the congregation of Christians should make use as often as they be assembled..." And why should we celebrate the Lord's Supper frequently? Because, Calvin says, when we come to Jesus' Table, "we are really made participants of the body and the blood of Jesus, of His death, of His life, of His Spirit and of all His benefits."

Finally, there's a *missional reason*. In the post-modern time in which we live, numerous communication experts have noted that left-brained, propositional communication is simply not effective in the way that it once was. Instead, the most powerful modes of communication center on image and story, symbol and narrative. The practice of Holy Communion dramatically portrays the Gospel story in just this way. This is why St. Augustine of Hippo was fond of calling the Eucharist "a visible word"- a dramatic, visual preaching of the Good News to all five of our senses!

I'm excited for the months ahead, to savor and taste the grace, community, and mission of Jesus together, and I can't wait to join you at His Table.




DEVELOPING A CARING CONGREGATION

PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY


Our *Prayer Shawl group* has resumed meeting in the Library on the 1st Monday of the month at 2pm.

The Thursday Men's Prayer Breakfast by Jake Swartout

The Thursday Men's Prayer Breakfast (TMPB) was a spinoff of the Wednesday Breakfast. The Wednesday Breakfast (1973) was started by Rev. Dr. Jim Stout and began at 7:00 AM at the North Palm Beach Country Club. A few of us, whose business didn't start until 9:00 AM, felt that 7:00 was too early so we began a new meeting at 7:30 AM. At first there were 6 regular members and an occasional visitor. We met in several places, including local restaurants, people's houses and at one time the closed down bar of the Holiday Inn (now Doubletree). We would share our highs and lows and usually have special prayer time. In the early stages we didn't have a lesson.



One of our regulars, who was a refrigerator repairman, suggested that he had a customer who was in need and thought it would be a nice gesture to provide her with a Thanksgiving feast. We went shopping and delivered Mrs. Sermons a turkey, the trimmings, and all kind of extra junk that guys would buy. We also delivered a Bible. We continued with that for a couple more years and then one day when we delivered, we were told that Mrs. Sermons had passed away, but her daughter said she would do like she had done in the past – that is to cook up the turkey and distribute it to the neighborhood. We hadn't realized that she was taking care of the entire neighborhood. At one of the later meetings that year, while we were sharing highs and lows, we were informed by Don Mason that he was leaving his accounting practice and going to Seminary. We pledged \$100 per month to his schooling, and it is there that we noticed that our group of prayer warriors was increasing in numbers. The next year we bought turkey dinners from Publix and distributed them. We did that project for over 15 years.

We also pledged \$100 to a member's son, Dave Sellers, who was an Intern at First Pres and was going to Seminary. In 1986 the new sanctuary had been completed and Dr. Bill Duke had some donated money, and he gave it to the breakfast group. John Bills had purchased the RCA building and gave the kitchen equipment to the men's group. The TMPB converted the old sanctuary into a Fellowship Hall where we met until 1998 when the current Fellowship Hall was built.

It was that time that Ken Coleman aka Coleman (Ad Color) Printing suggested that we pray for people and print special cards to mail to those in need of prayer. All those cards were signed by attendees. These cards have been one of the truly blessed part of the TMPB.

In 1995, Bob and Jimmy Felder attended the breakfast and told us of a concern on their heart. The attraction to drugs and crack cocaine was becoming rampant in Riviera Beach and they had a desire of go to the streets and fight it. It was then that Jesus and You Ministries was formed. J.A.Y. Ministries either was chaired by or attended by a member of the TMPB for over 20 years. True Fast Ministries was also founded through TMPB.

A couple of prominent Christian men have spoken at the breakfast: George Sweeting, author and former President of Moody Bible, and Billy Graham's son, Franklin Graham, of Samaritan's Purse. President Reagan sent us a personal note after receiving a prayer card when he had been shot.

The TMPB is approximately 46 years and is the oldest standing prayer group at First Pres. About 70% of the attendees are members of First Pres. Others come from many churches around Palm Beach County. We are a non-denominational Christian prayer meeting. TMPB meets every Thursday except on Thanksgiving or if Christmas or New Year's falls on Thursday. We also meet on Good Friday and invite the entire church to attend. Due to the pandemic, we also Zoom our meetings and had viewers from Peru and India. Our meetings start at 7:30 AM. We have breakfast and often sing a hymn. We will have a 20-minute lesson provided by one of the attendees, then we share highs and lows around the table. We send in prayer requests to the man who will pray, and he will read the supplications to the body. Throughout the morning each member who wishes to send a card will start one and pass it around for signatures of the attendees.

There have been times when attendance was low, but recently, we are averaging 30-35 attendees each week and we would love to have you come. After all, we are noted for having the "World's Most Famous Cheese Grits."


Ages 60 and up

Intern Reflections

Looking back on my internship with the FPC Student Ministries Staff this summer, one of the most rewarding aspects was getting to pour back into a community that shaped me in so many significant ways growing up. GLOBAL MISSIONS SPOTLIGHT THE LEHNS





THE LEHNS

Lynn and John Lehn are missionaries who have been serving God in the region of the former Yugoslavia since 1992, ministering first in Belgrade, Serbia, for over seven years, then in Zagreb, Croatia for over 13 years and now in Dubrovnik, Croatia since 2012. First Pres has partnered with the Lehns for 20 years. They are accountable to their mission board, Greater Europe Mission, whose mission is reaching Europe by multiplying disciples and growing Christ's Church.

John affiliates with churches in the Dubrovnik area in support of local ministers in planting and growing new churches. He spends much of his time sharing the preaching and mentoring while they work to bring their church to a sustainable position. At his own church his major chal lenge during the COVID period has been to continuously maintain worship together in person. John has also had a major role beyond his city by leading a regional conference for the 7 evangelical churches in Croatia with much success.

Lynn leads a church women's ministry with special outreach events during the year for those struggling with trauma and abuse. Her work has led to significant positive change in marriages and relationships within the church. Lynn has also had a major role beyond the local area. She led a country-wide conference for "Hope for the Wounded" where lay leaders are trained. The trainees are mentored and serve in their home churches through small groups with another trained leader. The impact of her work has been felt throughout the country.

We had the pleasure of John and Lynn visiting us and John speaking at the services at First Pres in September. They ask that we support them in prayer for the challenges they face and to continue to spread God's word throughout their area.

ANTONIO REYES

Our ministry partner in the Yucatan is Pastor Antonio Reyes who lives with his wife, Ruth, and their three children in Merida, Mexico. In the past year, the ministry of their church and presbytery has been concentrated on works of mercy. Flooding from tropical storms destroyed crops; Covid has resulted in many deaths and severe economic crises. Their Session has expressed deep gratitude for two financial gifts from First Pres which have helped them as they also use their own resources to provide food parcels and soup kitchens and meet their church's basic needs. A very small special gift from First Pres even provided the oxygen needed to keep one of Antonio's extended family members alive. They are so appreciative of our support.



CHOOSE JOY
The joy of the Lord is your strength (Neh 8:10)

 ${f N}$ ehemiah was born in exile in Persia. His name means "Yahweh has comforted," a name which reflected his parents' view of their lost heritage as Jews. He rose to the position of cupbearer to the Persian King, Antaxerxes, which gave him confidential access to this powerful king. Nehemiah heard that the Jews still living in Jerusalem, the land of his forefathers, were in distress and the walls of the city were demolished. Nehemiah's heart was greatly troubled by this news so he prayed for four months that God would make a way for him to rebuild the city walls. Miraculously, the King granted him a leave of absence, along with the resources necessary to complete the task. When God's people are given a mission, He provides everything for their work.


It would have taken about three months for Nehemiah to travel to Jerusalem, as it was almost 1000 miles away. When he arrived, he carefully planned out how to accomplish the work before him. Because of his great leadership skills in motivating everyone to help, it only took 52 days to rebuild the massive walls and gates. Nehemiah realized though, in working with these Jewish refugees, that they had lost their spiritual foundation. Nehemiah enlisted the help of Ezra the priest to rebuild the walls of faith and obedience of God's chosen remnant and renew their covenant with the living God. As a result of Nehemiah and Ezra helping the people understand how they had forgotten God, the people decided one day to gather together as one, coming with the right attitude - unified, attentive and responsive. Ezra stood on a platform so everyone could see and hear him, and he read from the Book of the Law of Moses and explained it from morning until midday: The results from reading and understanding God's Word were that the people worshipped and were spiritually renewed. They mourned because the Jews had been without the Word of God for so long and had remorse for having neglected it. Nehemiah and Ezra told the people not to weep because that very day was holy to the Lord, their God, because they renewed their covenant with Him. They told the people to go home to celebrate and rejoice by feasting and sharing with those who had less and reminded them that whatever difficulties came their way that "the joy of the Lord is your strength."

The theme of the 2022 Stewardship Campaign is "Choose Joy." The way that we find joy is summed up in John 15:10-11 where Jesus said, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love. These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full." The most visible expressions of an abiding relationship with Jesus are joy and love. Jesus says we will be filled with joy when we truly love Him by keeping His commandments. When it comes to stewardship, the Lord tells us He wants the first portion of all He has given us - our time, our talents and our treasures. This means we 1) make it a priority to spend time daily in the Word, praying and being still to hear from Him; 2) use the spiritual gifts He has given us to serve in His church and help other people; and 3) give a percentage of our income to the Lord before we pay for anything else. Doing these things expresses our gratitude for all He has given us and displays our love and trust in Him. When we obey God's commands, we CHOOSE JOY, because that is what He gives to us in abundance when we do so.

The 2022 Stewardship Campaign will begin in early October. You will receive a letter which details the campaign plan from Wentz Miller, who is the chair of the campaign. As is customary for this church, we will send to you a campaign brochure and a pledge card for you to complete, which shows your commitment to supporting the ministries of First Pres in 2022. Also, over the past few years, we have shown a graphic so you can see the progress we are making in our pledge goals over the 6 weeks of the campaign. This year we will track the dollar amount of our pledges as if we are going to build a wall, just as God laid on Nehemiah's heart to do. This will symbolize our commitment to God and His Church. A person will also be displayed (to track the number of pledges) which symbolizes our commitment to follow God and CHOOSE JOY.

Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:13).
